

#1 ELK POPULATION

In 1907, only 41,000 elk remained in North America. Thanks of the money and hard work invested by hunters to restore and conserve habitat, elk number grew to 550,000 by 1981, when RMEF was founded. Today, there are more than 1.1 million.




#2 WHITETAIL POPULATION

In 1900, only 500,000 whitetails remained in North America. Thanks to conservation work spearheaded by hunters, today there are more than 30 million.




#3 TURKEY POPULATION

In 1900, only 100,000 wild turkey remained. Thanks for hunters, today there are more than 6 million.



#4 DUCK POPULATION


In 1901, few ducks remained. Thanks to hunters' efforts to restore and conserve wetlands, today there are more than 32 million.

#5 PRONGHORN ANTELOPE POPULATION

In the 1920s, only 13,000 pronghorn antelope remained. Thanks to hunters, today there are more than 1.1 million.



HUNTING E CONSERVATION

#6 NON HUNTED SPECIES

Habitat restoration, scientific research, and wildlife law enforcement—all funded by hunters—benefit countless species that are never hunted.



HUNTING E CONSERVATION

#7 LICENSES & FEES

Through state licenses and fees, hunters pay \$896 million per year for conservations programs.


#8 & DONATIONS

Through donations and auctions to groups like RMEF, hunters add \$440 million per year to conservation efforts.



#9 CONSERVATION DOLLARS

In 1937, hunters requested an 11% tax on guns, ammo, bows and arrows to directly fun conservation. That tax, so far, raised more than \$17.7 billion to date and nearly \$1 billion in 2024.



#10 STATE AGENCY FUNDING

60% of budget funding for state fish and wildlife agencies, which are tasked with the responsibility of wildlife management, is generated by hinders and anglers, thanks to excise taxes and the purchase of licenses/fees.

#11 CONSERVATION PROGRAMS

All together, hunters pay more than \$1.6 billion a year for conservation programs. No one gives more!



#12 HUNTING APPROVAL

Four out of five Americans approve of hunting, partly because hunters are American's greatest positive force for conservation.



#13 SPORTSMAN & WOMEN

Every single day, sportsman and women contribute \$8.1 million to conservation.

#14 LAND CONSERVATION & ACCESS

Hunters generate funding for land conservation and public access work. In 2024 alone, RMEF completed 18 land projects in 12 states that conserved 25,594 acres of elk and big game habitat.



#15 LAND CONSERVATION & ACCESS

Hunters generate funding for land conservation and public access work. In 2024, RMEF opened or improved public access to 21, 816 acres with a lifetime total of 1.6 million acres.



HUNTING E CONSERVATION

#16 HABITAT STEWARDSHIP

Hunters generate funding for active forest management techniques, including prescribed burns, to enhance habitat for elk and other wildlife while also improving overall forest health. In 2024, RMEF completed 138 habitat stewardship projects in 22 states that enhanced 178,081 acres.




HUNTING E CONSERVATION

#17 WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT

A wildlife management tool, hunting help balance wildlife populations with what the land can support, limits crop damage and assists with disease management.

HUNTING E CONSERVATION

#18 WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT

Hunters generate funding for scientific wildlife research. In 2024 alone, RMEF allocated just over \$1 million that leveraged \$5.8 million in partner funding for elk research in 13 states and three projects of national benefit.



#19 PREDATORS

Hunters help manage growing number of predators such as mountain lions, bears, coyotes and wolves. The government spends millions to control predators and varmints while hunters have proven more than willing to pay for that opportunity.


HUNTERS help control PREDATOR populations

#20 BIG GAME COLLISION'S

Deer-vehicle collisions kill over 200 motorists and cost over \$7.5 billion a year. For every deer hit by a driver, hunters take six.

RMEF provides support for hunter education, outdoor conservation events for youth and adults, mentored hunts, recreational shooting programs and more.


#23 HEALTHY NUTRITION

#24 ELK RESTORATION


With funding from hunters, RMEF helped restore wild elk herds to eight states and provinces.
